Iron Arrow® Honor Society - Proposed Amendments

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE IRON ARROW HONOR SOCIETY

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Iron Arrow Honor Society is governed by a written Fourth Amended and Restated Constitution, dated August 30, 2021 (the "Constitution"); and

WHEREAS, Article XII of the Constitution provides that the Constitution may be amended by a two thirds vote of the Active Members (as defined in the Constitution) at a meeting so long as the proposal to amend and the exact wording of the amendment shall have been submitted to the Tribe not less than thirty days prior to the date of the meeting at which such amendment shall be voted upon; and

WHEREAS, Jaret L. Davis is an Active Member (as defined under the Constitution) with full rights appurtenant thereto, including, without limitation, the right to make motions at meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Council Of Elders of Iron Arrow Honor Society (as defined under the Constitution) shall function as the Advisory Board of Iron Arrow, with all the duties and privileges of such a board and shall have, as prescribed in the Constitution among its duties reviewing any amendments, modifications or other revisions to this Constitution that are submitted or requested before such changes are published to the Tribe;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Jaret L. Davis, in his capacity as an Active Member, and the Iron Arrow Council of Elders as the body charged with reviewing and putting forth proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Iron Arrow Honor Society, hereby makes a motion that the below described amendments to the Constitution be submitted to the general membership at a duly convened regularly scheduled or specially convened meeting of the Tribe, whichever occurs first:

Proposed Amendment:

All references in the Constitution to "Chief' shall be revised to read "Chair".

All references to "Son of Chief in the Constitution shall be revised to read "Treasurer".

All references to "Medicine Man" in the Constitution shall be revised to read "Lawmaker".

The Constitution shall be amended and restated to incorporate the above amendments.

AND IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that in all other respects, the Constitution shall remain unchanged by this Amendment.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, Jaret L. Davis, an Active Member, and the Council Of Elders of Iron Arrow Honor Society have caused this motion for consideration of proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Iron Arrow Honor Society to be executed this 12th day of July 2022.

Iron Arrow® Honor Society - Proposed Amendments

Commentary to Proposed Amendments:

For the past five years or so, Iron Arrow has had to contend with concerns expressed throughout the University of Miami community and beyond with respect to the issue of cultural appropriation. While these concerns originally were noted by certain faculty within the University community and by a few members within Iron Arrow itself, they have now been matched by voices within the actual indigenous community (i.e., members of various Native American Tribes, including the Miccosukee and the Seminole).

Iron Arrow remains steadfast in its assertion that its use of Native American iconography, terms and traditions is not cultural appropriation. One cannot appropriate that to which they have been given an express license to use, particularly when that license is and continues to be ratified and validated by the culture in question. The Miccosukee played an integral role in Iron Arrow's creation and this special bond has continued to be expressed for nearly a century, punctuated by the Miccosukee's issuance of a formal charter to Iron Arrow at the Tribe's 50th anniversary in 1976 and the execution in 2018 by the Miccosukee of a Memorandum of Understanding outlining yet again the special bond that exists between the organization and the Miccosukee. For what it's worth, that bond has been orally validated and ratified countless other times by the past and current leadership of the Miccosukee, including its current Chairman, Talbert Cypress, and his Chief of Staff, Curtis Osceola.

Having said that, the voices of individual members of the various Native American tribes cannot be ignored. It is clear that there are members of certain Native American Tribes, including among the Miccosukee themselves, who have expressed dismay at to what is seen as an overly casual use of Miccosukee and Seminole traditions. While somewhat isolated, these expressions of concern are indeed growing. Most disturbingly there is somewhat of a generational divide inherent in the universe of those expressing these concerns. Fortunately, the current leadership of the Miccosukee also hail from this younger generation; however, it is also clear that unless we take action to address these concerns and continue a dialogue, we very much risk a 100-year relationship.

To address these various concerns, beginning in 2018, Iron Arrow implemented an annual process by which it consulted with the leadership of the Miccosukee to continually review its traditions to ensure fidelity to the Miccosukee and their heritage. This process entailed a two-part rubric:

- (i) Where a given tradition was directly given to Iron Arrow by the Miccosukee or the Seminole there would be a presumption as to its validity in favor of its retention. The most obvious example of this type of tradition would be the jackets Iron Arrow members wear (which jackets even the detractors have acknowledged we have a right to wear).
- (ii) Where research indicates a given tradition likely was not given to Iron Arrow by the Miccosukee or the Seminole then the presumption of validity and retention disappears and a de novo review of its appropriateness and desirability is conducted.

As has been covered by the University media, in 2020, this process resulted a determination for Iron Arrow Honor Society to change certain practices in its ritual:

- Use of the tapping drum only when actually tapping the tappee, and when presenting such tappee to the Chairman at the Iron Arrow Mound
- Revision of the folding of the arms, if desired to convey solemnity, to instead consist of a crossing of the arms in front of the members with a clasping of the hands out front or hands at side.
- Revision of the titles of the student leaders as referenced in this Amendment

In addition to the above changes, other changes were instituted such as replacing the use of orange, green and white greasepaint to mark newly tapped members with bead jewelry created for the newly tapped members by Miccosukee children, a new tradition that has far greater significance and cultural fidelity than was the case with the use of the greasepaint.

The changes were well received by the Miccosukee and by those who registered offense. Because the Constitution provides that ritual changes need only be approved by the Council of Elders, most of the changes were easily implemented. However, because the student titles are prescribed directly in the Constitution, those require additional action - the action proposed by this motion.

The change in titles is intended to represent fidelity to the modern terms currently used by the Miccosukee, at least with respect to officials with externally focused duties, with gender neutral terms where applicable. The new titles were recommended by the Miccosukee to align our practices with theirs.

It should be noted that the title of "Medicine Man" has caused particular consternation among those objecting. The title is a particularly sacred one and invokes many things. Use of it is akin to using a title of Rabbi, Priest or Imam.

If character is truly to be one of our foundational criteria, we must be willing to listen and respond to reasonable concerns made with respect to our practices. Note this does not mean we by default accept every isolated complaint that may be issued with respect to those practices. This was the mindset behind the rubric adopted by the Tribe in 2018. In any given instance a thorough, deliberate, and well-reasoned approach must accompany each review of a tradition's use.

Fall 2022 Luncheon Speaker: Coach Jim Morris

Coming out of a brilliant stint as Georgia Tech Baseball Head coach, Jim Morris decided that Miami was the institution that could flourish under his great leadership. Morris' first of five National Coach of the Year Honors came in 1994, very early in his career at the U. In only his first 6 years as Hurricanes Baseball Head Coach, Jim Morris guided our program to the , for six consecutive years, an NCAA record. He has won 17 of 23 NCAA Regional appearances

at the U, winning 13 of those consecutively, yet another record.

Jim Morris is a three-time national coach of the year and in 2008 won the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year, leading the Hurricanes to a 1,090-472-3 (.696) mark since arriving in 1994, slightly better than his 12 seasons at Georgia Tech (1982-93), with a 1,590-715-4 (.689) record.

The U saw Morris reaching several career milestones, with his 1000th Division I win coming in 2004. Entering 2015 Morris was one of the winningest active coaches in Division I baseball with 1,435 wins. He quickly moved up to seventh place with 1445 wins. Then, in 2016, Morris became just the sixth coach in the history of Division I baseball to reach the 1,500-win plateau, dramatically defeating Louisville 8-4 with a walk-off grand slam from Willie Abreu. Just 8 days later, he would also win for the 1000th time as a Cane, defeating Clemson 5-4 in 11 innings.

Affectionately known as "3" by those surrounding the UM program, under his guidance, three Hurricanes were selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball Draft in 2008. Junior first baseman Yonder Alonso (7th overall to the Cincinnati Reds), junior second baseman Jemile Weeks (12th overall to the Oakland Athletics), and junior right-handed pitcher Carlos Gutierrez (27th overall to the Minnesota Twins) were the first three of eight total `Canes taken in the 2008 draft. Over 150 total Major League Baseball players received guidance from Morris.

His prowess was not limited to college baseball. Morris has also had international success. From 1989-90, Morris served as head coach of the USA Baseball team winning a Silver Medal in the 1989 Presidential Cup (Taiwan), Bronze Medal at the Goodwill Games and the 1990 International Baseball Association (IBA) World All- Star Game in Atlanta. At the

Goodwill Games, his USA squad won two of three games against Cuba, marking the first time in history a senior-level team won a series with Cuba. In 1987, Morris served as pitching coach under Ron Fraser at the Pan American Games, winning a silver medal.



If you want to know what excellence looks like, take a look at Jim Morris' 29 years of as Hurricanes Baseball Head Coach. Having won national titles in 1999 and 2001 and the ACC Baseball Regular Season Championship in 2008, 2014, and 2016, Jim Morris is no stranger to success. Under his tremendous leadership, no program has qualified for the College World Series as much as Miami Hurricanes. He also guided our continued their reign as the only college baseball team that has qualified for the NCAA tournament for 44 consecutive years.

In addition to carrying on Miami's great baseball reputation for 25 years, Morris personally led the charge in the construction of Alex Rodriguez Park, and logged hundreds of hours raising funds for the stadium's renovation prior to its reopening in 2009. Morris was tapped into Iron Arrow in 2005, and for his brilliant work, he was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2020.
